JAMES GORDON BENNETT MEDAL

Awarded each year since 1869. Commodore Bennett wrote at that time, "My father being desirous of adding an additional competition to the members of the Metropolitan Fire Department, in discipline, courage and honesty with which their duties are now performed... has directed me to send the enclosure for a medal to be struck annually... and to be conferred upon such member best entitled to that reward."

ADDITIONAL AWARDS (\$1,000)

Cash Award, \$600.00. (The Commissioner Robert O. Lowery Award), donated by the late Honorary Deputy Chief Bertram Brummer and his wife Susie Brummer.

THE FIRE FOUNDATION OF NEW YORK

Cash award, \$400.00, donated by the Fire Foundation of New York. This organization was established in 1968 by a group of prominent New York City businessmen, friends of the New York Fire Department, in the interests of rewarding our Fire Department members who perform acts above and beyond the call of duty.



DR. HARRY M. ARCHER MEDAL

This medal was endowed in 1917 by Herman L. Reis, F.D.N.Y. Medical Officer. The deed of the gift states that the medal shall be awarded every three years to the holder of the Bennett Medal who performed the best rescue among the Bennett Medal awards during the preceding three years. Last awarded in 1983.

THE FIRE FOUNDATION OF NEW YORK

Cash Award, \$500.00 donated by the Fire Foundation of New York. This organization was established in 1968 by a group of prominent New York City businessmen, friends of the New York Fire Department. It is presented in the interest of rewarding our Fire Department members who perform acts above and beyond the call of duty.



CHIEF WESLEY WILLIAMS MEDAL

This medal is donated by the officers and members of the Vulcan Society of the Fire Department. This medal shall be awarded annually to a member of the Department whose distinguished service in the line of duty receives recognition by the Board of Merit of the Fire Department.

\$100.00 SAVINGS BOND

An accompanying \$100.00 Savings Bond is awarded to the recipient of the Chief Wesley Williams Medal by the officers and members of said organization.

MEDALS FOR VALOR

Walor' is defined by Webster's Dictionary as "Strength of mind or spirit which enables one to encounter danger with firmness: personal bravery."

To award some visible token, such as a medal or ribbon, for valor goes far back into history. In our own country, it was General George Washington who is credited with originating the first American decoration for valor, the Purple Heart, during the last encampment of the Revolutionary Army near Newburgh, New York. To this day, the Purple Heart still bears the Washington family's ancestral coat-of-arms.

In the Fire Department, the senior medal for valor, and its most prestigious award, is the *James Gordon Bennett Medal*, first conferred in 1969, when the Paid Department was hardly four years old.

In this year of 1985, the *Bennett* will be awarded for the 117th time, at the Fire Department's happiest and proudest annual event, "Medal Day." The time and date are 11 a.m., Thursday June 6th, with Mayor Edward I. Koch and Fire Commissioner Joseph E. Spinnato again presiding at the ceremony.

W.N.Y.F. Magazine takes great pleasure in presenting this pictorial of all the medals for valor that are awarded to our heroes. The 2nd Issue, 1985 of W.N.Y.F. will contain the photos of this year's recipients.

We hope that you take the time to read the brief backgrounds of the medals that are displayed on these pages. They will be awarded to "The Bravest of the Bravest," on a day in which we all share, in some large or small way, the events of their heroic lifesaving efforts, made while balancing on that thin line that separates life from death.



HUGH BONNER MEDAL

Donated by the Rev. James Johnson, Fire Chaplain attached to Grace Church in 1897, and named in honor of Chief Hugh Bonner, "a stalwart Chief of Department who preferred to rule by example." This medal was first awarded in 1897.

JOSEPH REICH MEMORIAL FUND (Also Awarded \$250.00 Cash Award)

This annual award has been made possible by the establishment of a trust fund in the last will and testament of Mr. Joseph Reich, for "outstanding heroic service," rendered by members of the Department.



THOMAS E. CRIMMINS MEDAL

Mrs. May M. Burke provided in her will for the endowment of this medal in memory of her father, He was a contractor, builder and a loyal New Yorker, and son of a volunteer fireman. First presented in 1912.

The accompanying \$200.00 Savings Bond is awarded to the recipient of the Steuben Association Medal by the officers and members of said organization.



JOHN H. PRENTICE MEDAL (Also Awarded \$250.00 Cash Award)

This medal is the gift of Mrs. Marion Prentice Brookman in memory of her father. The PRENTICE and HENRY D. BROOKMAN awards are given for "an act of intelligent bravery." First awarded in 1921.



PULASKI ASSOCIATION MEDAL (Also Awarded \$200.00 Savings Bond)

(AISO AWITEEU 3200.00 JOVINIS BOILU)

Donated by the Pulaski Association (in behalf of the Polish-Slavonic membership), and awarded annually to a member of the Fire Department whose distinguished service in the line of duty receives recognition by the Board of Merit of the Fire Department. The accompanying \$200.00 Savings Bond is awarded to the recipient of the Pulaski Association Medal by the officers and members of the said organization.



COLUMBIA ASSOCIATION MEDAL (Also Awarded \$200.00 Cash Award)

This medal was donated by the officers and members of the Columbia Association of the Fire Department. This medal shall be awarded an-Department. MAYOR LaGUARDIA MEDAL

The Honorable Fiorello H. LaGuardia, while mayor, was the City's No. 1 fire buff and frequently "turned out" at large fires. He had a keen interest in the problems of fire prevention and extinguishment. This medal was first awarded in 1937.

\$100.00 SAVINGS BOND

An accompanying \$100.00 Savings Bond is awarded to the recipient of the Mayor LaGuardia Medal by Mr. and Mrs. Jack W. Mayer, II, friends of the Fire Department.



CHIEF JOSEPH B. MARTIN MEDAL

This medal is donated in honor of Assistant Chief Joseph B. Martin, who served with the Department for 47 years. Two cash awards will be given of \$100 each. The first is in memory of Fr. Mike Donnelly of Ladder Co. 33, who died after a long battle with cancer in 1933. The second eash award is given in memory of Fr. Cesaar J. Macari of Ladder Co. 128, who died in the line of duty.



EMILY TREVOR-MARY B. WARREN MEDAL

These sisters, in their deed of gift, wrote, "...for the purpose of encouraging the members of the force in the exercise...spirit of heroic endeavor under circumstances of special danger."

Awarded for the first time in 1899.

JOSEPH REICH MEMORIAL FUND (Also Awarded \$250.00 Cash Award)

This annual award has been made possible by the establishment of a trust fund in the last will and testament of Mr. Joseph Reich, for "outstanding heroic service," rendered by members of the Department.



FRANKLIN DELANO ROOSEVELT MEDAL (Naer Tormid Society)

This medal was donated by the officers and members of the Naer Tormid Society of the Fire Department in honor of the late President. It was first awarded in 1946.

\$250.00 CASH AWARD

The recipient of the Naer Tormid Society, Franklin Delano Roosevelt Medal shall receive a cash award of \$100.00 donated by Hon. Assistant Chief, Dr. Harold B. Hermann. An additional grant of \$150.00 to be given by Honorary Deputy Chief Alexander L. Kaplan in memory of his mother, Sophie Toby Kaplan.



CHIEF JOHN J. McELLIGOTT MEDAL

Named in honor of the late Chief and Fire Commissioner. Chief McElligott joined the department in 1905 and retired in 1941 after a long and fruitful* career. He died in 1946. This medal was endowed by William F. Conran and was first awarded in 1937.

\$200.00 SAVINGS BOND

An accompanying \$200.00 Savings Bond is awarded to the recipient of the Chief John J. McElligott Medal in memory of Joseph Aloysius Mulheren, a friend of the Fire Department.



BRUMMER MEDAL

(Also Awarded \$850.00 Cash Award)

The late Bertram Brummer and his wife Susie have had a long standing interest in the New York City Fire Department. Bertram, a member of the New York Stock Exchange, received training during World War II at the Fire Department college, was assigned to Engine Co. 44 and attained the rank of Captain in the Auxiliary Corps. His company won an award for excellence. In 1961, Bertram and Susie Brummer established a fund for a medal to be awarded annually to a member of the Fire Department for an act of bravery. A generous cash award is included in addition to the medal which was first awarded in 1962. The late Bertram Brummer and his wife Susie



SIGNAL SEVEN-SEVEN FIRE CLUB MEDAL (Also Awarded \$300.00 Cash Award)

Onated by the Signal Seven-Seven Fire Club of Brooklyn. To be awarded annually to a member of the Fire Department for an act of bravery. Cash awards of \$100.00, donated by the members of the Seven-Seven Fire Club and \$200.00 donated by Hon. D.C. Jonathan R. Kort, memory of Mr. T. Z. Burgerman and Mr. Otto J. Kort is also awarded to the recipient of this medal.



ALBERT S. JOHNSTON MEDAL

Albert S. Johnston was a Captain in the Fire Department with a record of fifty years of faithful service in that organization. Ten years after his retirement in 1927 this medal was endowed by William F. Conran. First presented in 1937, it may also be awarded to a member of the Fire Patrol.

\$200.00 SAVINGS BOND

An accompanying \$200.00 Savings Bond is awarded to the recipient of the Albert S. Johnston Medal by Honorary Assistant Chief Thomas D. Levy, a friend of the Fire Department. Chief Levy is President of the Honorary Fire Officers Association, F.D.N.Y.



VINCENT J. KANE MEDAL

First presented in 1952, this medal is named in honor of the late Vincent Kane, labor leader and long time president of the Uniformed Firemen's Association. It was endowed by the officers and members of that organization.

UNIFORMED FIREFIGHTERS ASSOCIATION (Cash Award—\$200.00)

The recipient of the Vincent J. Kane Medal shall receive a cash award of \$200.00, donated by the Uniformed Firefighters Association.



N.Y.S. HONORARY FIRE CHIEFS ASSOCIATION MEDAL

The New York State Honorary Fire Chiefs Association is an independent, non-profit organization dedicated solely to the welfare and interests of firefighters of the State of New York. This medal, first awarded in 1983, is dedicated to honor a firefighter who has performed with valor as determined by the Board of Merit of the ED.N.Y.



M. J. DELEHANTY MEDAL

The founder and dean of civil service schools bearing his name endowed this medal in 1937, "to be awarded annually to a member of the Fire Department whose distinguished service in the line of duty receives recognition by the Board of Merit of the Fire Department."

HONOR LEGION MEDAL (Also Awarded \$250.00 Cash Award)

The Honor Legion is only open to the "Bravest of the Bravest," both active and retired. Prerequisites for eligibility are confined to those firefighters, of all ranks, who have received Department recognition and have been awarded either a Class I, II, or III awards for deeds of valor which have been performed at imminent risk of their lives. The firefighters are required to have been commended for their meritorious acts by the Board of Merit of the Fire Department and are entitled to wear such insignias.



WILLIAM F. CONRAN MEDAL

Mr. Conran endowed this medal in 1937. He was an Honorary Deputy Chief of Department. His profession of fire protection engineer enabled him to improve the efficiency of fire fighting

This award is presented by the American Legion Post No. 930. It has been given in memory of Mark M. Wohlfeld, a life member of the Fire Department Post, a Colonel in the U.S. Army Reserve and a retired firefighter of the N.Y.C. Fire Department. The history of this intrepid warrior's exploits are graphically related in the second and third issue of WNYE, 1945. After his retirement from the Fire Department, he continued to serve his country and his fellow man, by working for the Veterans Administration. He died on May 24, 1978 and is interred in Arlington National Cemetery, Mark Wholfeld is rightfully adjudged as one who gave so much for his fellow man.
