

Kevin J. Smith, FF1 Hazardous Materials Company 1

Kevin Joseph Smith is remembered by his family to have always loved uniforms. Growing up through a presidential assassination, war protest, hippies and radicals. Kevin was an altar boy and boy scout. A graduate of Island Trees High School in Levittown in 1972, he joined the Marines at 17 years of age. His career in the Fire Department, starting in 1978, is one of distinction and heroism. In 1984 he became a Charter Member of Hazardous Materials Company 1. He became an instructor and trained others in Hazmat. He was a responder/planner in the N.Y.C. Mayor's Office of Emergency Management, where he assisted in authoring and implementing the City's first plan on Terrorism and Weapons of Mass Destruction and to get this plan out to the nation. Response to terrorism became his passion. He was a member of the Biological Warfare Improved Response Program and F.E.M.A. and U.S.A.R. team to handle disaster worldwide. Recently he worked alongside the United States Marines Chemical Biological Incident Response Force as a representative of the FDNY.

During his career, Kevin received dozens of certifications and awards, including EMT, First Responder, Health –Asbestos Inspector, Hazmat Technical Specialists, Heroism Award from Firehouse Magazine, Silver Badge form the Life Saving Benevolent Association of New York, and The Mayor LaGuardia Medal was awarded for his heroism in recovering victims from Flight 5050. One of the first to arrive on the scene when a commercial jetliner went into the water off LaGuardia Airport, Kevin along with Lt. Al Warta, dove into the water to gain entry into the sinking tail section, found and helped save a passenger.

Kevin was also a volunteer firefighter with East Farmingdale Fire Department and Mastic Fire Department. He volunteered with Mastic Ambulance. His sense of duty on all levels cannot be replaced but will be carried out by the family he leaves behind.

On Sept. 11, 2001 Kevin witnessed the strike of the first plane on the World Trade Center. On his way to the scene he called his wife, Jerri, telling her she wouldn't be hearing from him for sometime. Jerri later said, "You could almost hear him snapping on his Superman cape. He knew this day would come."

His greatest love was for his family. His quiet strength and pride lives on in them. He leaves behind his wife Jerri, his children Brian, Nichole, Thomas, Vincent, Christopher, Josephine, Jennifer and Anthony, his father Harry Smith, his grandson Kevin, and his five brothers and sisters, Margaret Brown, Cathy Kross, Stephen Smith, Marianne Panicola and Brian Smith.

As we sit and wonder what might happen, it's brought us together all as one. This would make our father proud. Our family is strong when we're together. So no matter what happens, we'll keep our heads high and our hearts open for you Dad.
