


Firefighter Martin Demeo Haz-Mat 1




Batallion Chief John Fanning



He has given us so much, and is forever in our hearts.




Firefighter Jonathan Hohmann Haz-Mat 1

A six-year FDNY veteran, he was also chief training officer for the Bellmore Volunteer Fire Department in his hometown, where he had served since graduating from High School. Rand was engaged to be married and loved children. His five nieces and nephews looked forward to boating and hiking with him and listening to his ghost stories. Rand owned a boat and enjoyed fishing, scuba diving, skiing and hunting. he had a great sense of humor and made everyone laugh. He lived a full life.



Firefighter Dennis Scauso Haz-Mat 1

Dennis was a family man, devoted loving husband, father, son and brother. He took great pleaure in his home building projects and discarded item restoration. Dennis was happiest when his home was filled with family and friends. He enriched the lives of all who knew him.

Firefighting wasn't Dennis' initial chosen career. However, he was a natural to the profession since he regarded all life as sacred, a true rescuer. As a child, he continually brought home lost and injured wildlife. For many years he enjoyed the company of a rescued raccoon he named "Sammy."


Just mention a trip to him and he'd be packing his bag.
