

On Sunday May 19 at approximately 2345 hrs. Firefighter Philip H. McArdle of Hazardous Materials Company #1 heard a large number of fire apparatus sirens passing his house. Realizing that this was no ordinary response Firefighter McArdle called the quarters of Haz-Mat 1 and spoke to Firefighter John Hack who was on house watch; at this time Firefighter Hack informed Firefighter McArdle that a Third Alarm was transmitted and the address was in the area of Tremont Ave. and Bruckner Blvd. Firefighter McArdle's in-laws lived nearby and he decided to check on them; so he proceeded to the scene of the third alarm.

Upon his arrival at the scene a brief conversation occurred with Chief Feehan and the Chief was informed by Firefighter McArdle that Hazardous Materials Company #1 was still in quarters and not responding to the scene. Firefighter McArdle was directed by Chief Feehan to inform Field Comm. to have Haz-Mat 1 to respond. Having done that and knowing that the vehicle would have to be off loaded Firefighter McArdle was directed to notify Island Transport to have a vehicle respond for off loading purposes. Firefighter McArdle then proceeded back to the fire area.

At the fire area Firefighter McArdle provided technical assistance to operating personnel (particularly 13 David & the Safety Operating Battalion) at the scene until the arrival of Haz-mat.

Firefighter McArdle assisted Haz Mat 1 upon their arrival and provided assistance as needed to other units during this long operation. Some of the work included: getting an additional Hurst tool cutter for Rescue 3 when their blade broke during the extrication of the victims - assisting Haz Mat 1 set-up the transfer pumps and grounding of the vehicles - assisted the Tactical Support Unit when taking up their equipment - setting up the cables around the chassis for the wreckers to remove the gasoline truck

Firefighter McArdle worked at the scene for almost 7 hours without relief and for his efforts I respectfully request he be considered for a voluntary duty Service "B".

6. DESCRIPTION OF UNIT OPERATION: (page 2)

At Approximately 0056 hrs. Hazardous Materials Company #1 responded to Bronx Box 4146 to assist operating forces at a major vehicle accident & Third Alarm Fire(Figure 1). Upon their arrival the Haz-Mat Officer (Capt. John Fatta) and the Entry Team (Firefighters Sean Cotter & Joseph Iovino) reported into the command post. A size-up briefing was conducted by several Chief Officers (Acting Chief of Dept. Feehan, Asst. Chief Nastro, Dep. Asst. Chief Felleni, Deputy Chief Neville 6th Division, Safety Operating Battalion Chief McDonald). Capt. Fatta & the Entry Team (Firefighters Sean Cotter & Joseph Iovino) along with Firefighter McArdle made a reconnaissance and reported the following information back to the command post. The Truck was an Island Transportation MC306, 5 compartment, 4,000 gal. gasoline truck fully loaded(Figure 2-4). Gasoline was continuing to flow out of the numbers 1 and 4 compartments hindering the body removal operations of the passenger vehicle (four 10-45 Code #1). The product flow would have to be stopped before any additional search & rescue operations continued. This operation was further hampered by the fact that the truck was on it's side in the building and the roof was resting on the cab of the truck.

The Entry Team (Firefighters Sean Cotter & Joseph Iovino) & Back-up Team (Firefighters Natale Russo & John Olewnicki) under the protection of hose lines approached the still burning vehicle and were successful in placing dome clamps on all of the dome assemblies(Figure 2-2); this two-fold action reduced the flow to minute amounts and made it possible for extinguishment and protected the covers from accidentally opening and releasing more product. The next operational concern involved shutting off the MC 306 which was still running; this was difficult to accomplish because access to the fuel cut-off valve was impossible. It was decided to smother the engine so a pillow was placed in the exhaust and the engine stalled. At this point the first four victims were going to be removed from the car. From the start to the finish of the body removal The Entry (Firefighters Sean Cotter & Joseph Iovino) & Back-up Team (Firefighters Natale Russo & John Olewnicki) monitored the area with explosive meters to make sure it was safe for operating personnel during this difficult task. During the extrication, Rescue 3's Hurst Tool Cutter blade broke, Fr. McArdle who was acting as a runner for equipment removed the Haz-Mat cutter and set it up for Rescue 3 to continue operations. The Decon Team (Firefighters Timothy Regan & James Finnel E-324) knowing that transfer operations would be conducted shortly; began setting up & assembling the transfer pump which would be used for off loading. Capt. Fatta was moving around the operation checking on each team's progress and keeping Chief Officers apprised of the conditions

6. DESCRIPTION OF UNIT OPERATION: (page 3)

When the Transfer truck arrived they had no equipment to off load the product; the Decon Team (Firefighters Timothy Regan & James Finnel E-324) anticipated this and had brought the necessary equipment (Haz-Mat's Weldon offloading pump and related accessories) to the scene earlier. Capt. Fatta had the transfer vehicle positioned in the proper position for transfer. Firefighter McArdle and the Decon Team (Firefighters Timothy Regan & James Finnel E-324) began grounding operations (Figure 2-3). After grounding was completed all the connections of hoses and pumps were assembled by the Entry Team to begin product transfer. The Back-up Team assembled the air supply and then continued monitoring the area with gx-4000 meters. At this point product transfer was started.

Capt. Fatta and Firefighter McArdle had both done a damage and risk assessment of the container and determined that the container's emergency shutoffs were badly damaged, the container was still firmly fastened to the chassis, compartments #1-#3-#4 domes were leaking slightly and the fill pipes that were going to be used would only allow for approximately 1/2 of each container to be off loaded through the closed system (Figure 2-1). The rest would have to be off loaded through the dome covers. Since this would be a calculated risk, rescue co's 3 & 4 manned foam hose lines and laid a blanket of foam and evacuation routes away from the trailer were given to each member by Capt. Fatta.

Off loading operations moved at a smooth pace and several times during the transfer operation the foam blanket had to be added to. The transfer operation was successful even though it was conducted under difficult circumstances (the stability of the structure as well as the vehicle, many ignition sources were still present eg. several small fires continued to burn, running engines of emergency equipment, exposed electrical wires from damaged traffic signals etc...). approximately 2,200 gallons were off loaded and placed in the transfer vehicle.

With the gasoline out of the way the Entry Team & the Back up under the direction of Capt. Fatta foamed each compartment. Capt. Fatta then directed the Haz-Mat members to remove all transfer equipment and set up for the removal from the store and the uprighting of the tank truck. The vehicle's chassis was chained in several places by Firefighter McArdle and was towed from the store by sanitation wrecker. The Entry Team & Safety Team now used the air bags to lift the vehicle so the Decon Team could get the chains around the vehicle to lift it with the sanitation wreckers. Work was completed at about 0830 hrs.

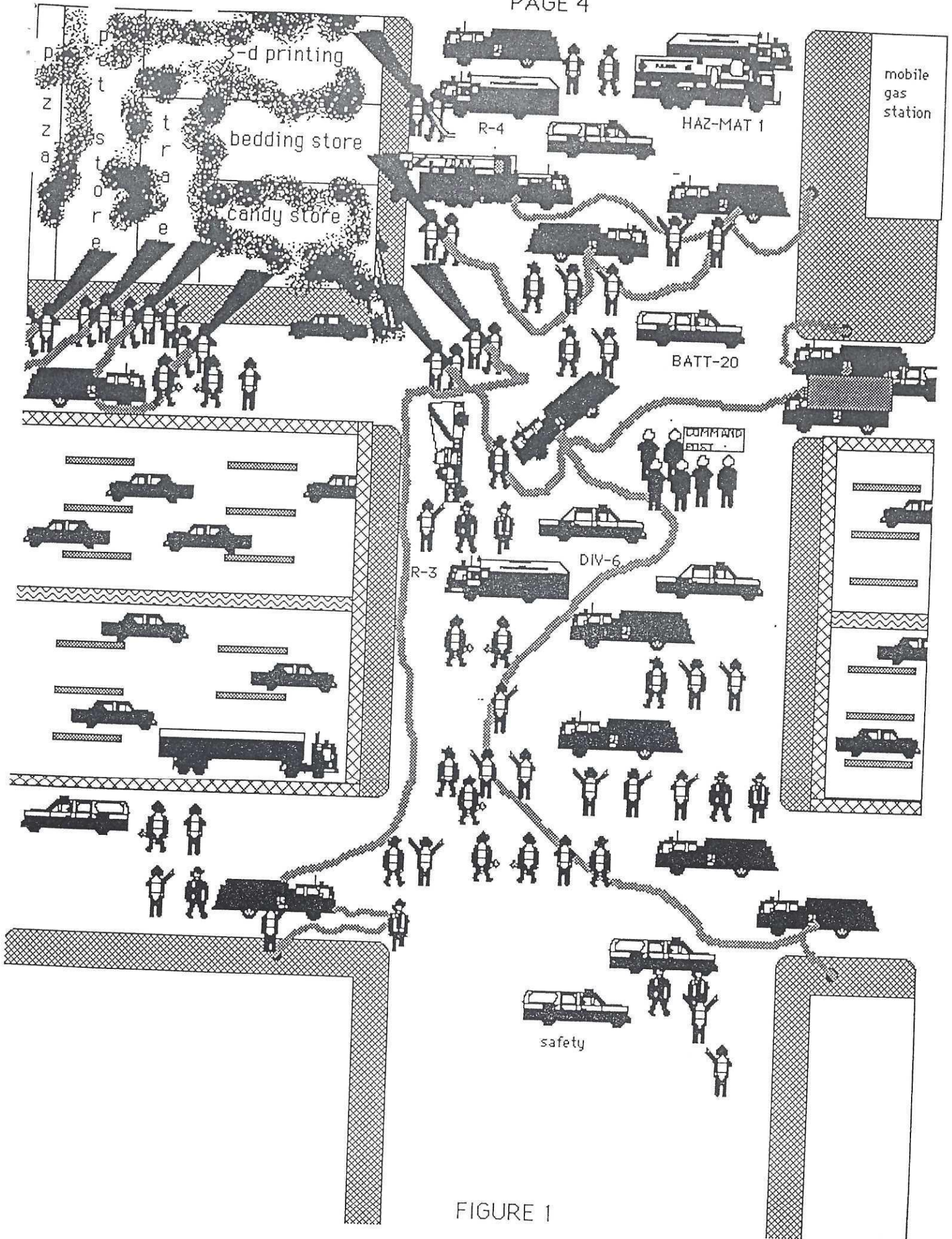

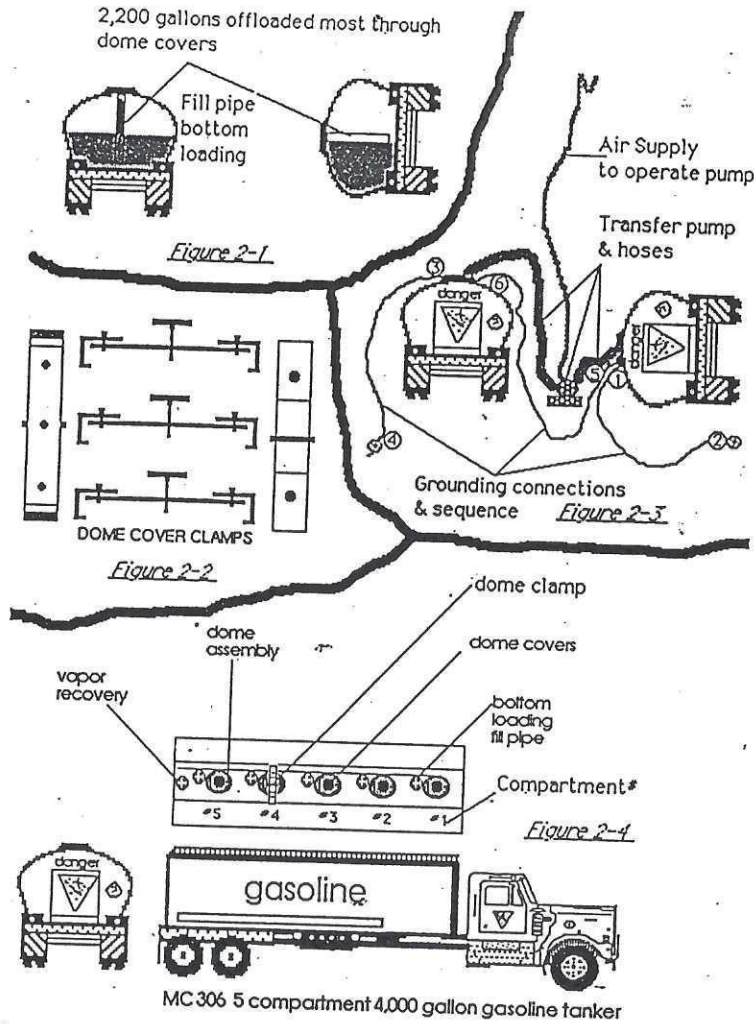
