At approximately 10:30 p.m. on August 14. 1388, while travelling east on SpagnoliRoad, Flainview, New York Fire Department Lieutenant Albert S. Warta, Jr. observed a fire on the road ahead. Approaching the scene. Lt. Warta observed that the fire source was a car which had struck a telephone pole. There was heavy damage to the front end of the car and the telephone pole, and the car was heavily involved in flames. No fire or police units had arrived on the scene, but there were several civilian bystanders.

Realizing that if this accident had just happened, and if so occupants may still be trapped within, Lt. Warta immediately stopped and rushed over to the vehicle. In the front seat he found two adult male, apparently unconscious.

Despite the intense heat, Lt. Warta tried to open the passenger door, but could not due to damage. He shouted "get out of the car, you're going to burn". On receiving no response from either unconscious victim he reached through the window to release the unconscious passenger's seat belt, which he did with difficulty, as the unconscious driver was laying across the passenger's lap. Although there seemed little possibility of rescuing both men due to the rapid spread of the fire and lack of assistance from rescue personnel or bystanders (no one of the now numerous spectators came forward), he finally got the seat belt released and was trying to pull the unconscious passenger through the window. At this time Mr. Frank Capek arrived to assist Lt. Warta, and together they were able to force the damaged door open and pull the passenger from the blazing car.

Moving to the unconscious driver (a tall, heavy individual), Lt. Warta attempted to pull him from the car but was stymied by the heat, the driver's size and unconscious, limp condition, and the fact that his feet were wedged under the dashboard due to damage. Several times Lt. Warta tried to pull him from the car, making little headway, and eventually tearing the unconscious driver's shirt. Diving into the car, Lt. Warta succeeded in freeing the driver's feet and tried to drag him from the vehicle. Once again the unconscious driver's feet became entangled in the wreckage, and again Lt. Warta dove into the car to free his feet. With fire starting to come through the firewall now, again the driver's feet caught on the wreckage, and for a third time, Lt. Warta again dove in to free them. Lt. Warta and Mr. Capek, who arrived back at the car at that time, finally succeeded in dragging the driver from the vehicle.

Placing the driver across the street by the first victim, Lt. Warta, a previously certified New York State A.E.M.T., checked both men for vital signs and found both relatively stable. By this time Nassau County P.D. units were arriving on the scene, and police officers instructed Mr. Warta to move the victims further from the car as they felt that an explosion was imminent. He did so. Lt. Warta continued to minister to the victims until Plainview F.D. units arrived on the scene to relieve him and extinguish the fully-involved vehicle.

Subsequently, the passenger was taken by ambulance to a nearby hospital, but the driver was seriously injured enough to warrant transport via helicopter to Nassau County Medical Center. Several Nassau police officers, Plainview firefighters and bystanders on the scene congratulated Lt. Warta and Mr. Capek for their selfless saving of the two victims.

Without regard to their personal safety, without any protective clothing or water protection, and despite great risk to their lives, the quick and courageous actions of Lieutenant Albert S. Warta, Jr. and Mr. Frank Capek undoubtedly resulted in saving the lives of both the driver and passenger. Fortunately, other than several minor cuts and bruises suffered by Lt. Warta, neither rescuer was seriously injured.


